30	31	* March 7, 1965 - "Bloody Sunday": On this day, civil rights activists attempted to march from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama, to demand voting rights for African Americans. The peaceful march was met with violence from state troopers and resulted in national outrage, ultimately leading to the passage of the Voting Rights Act.
