

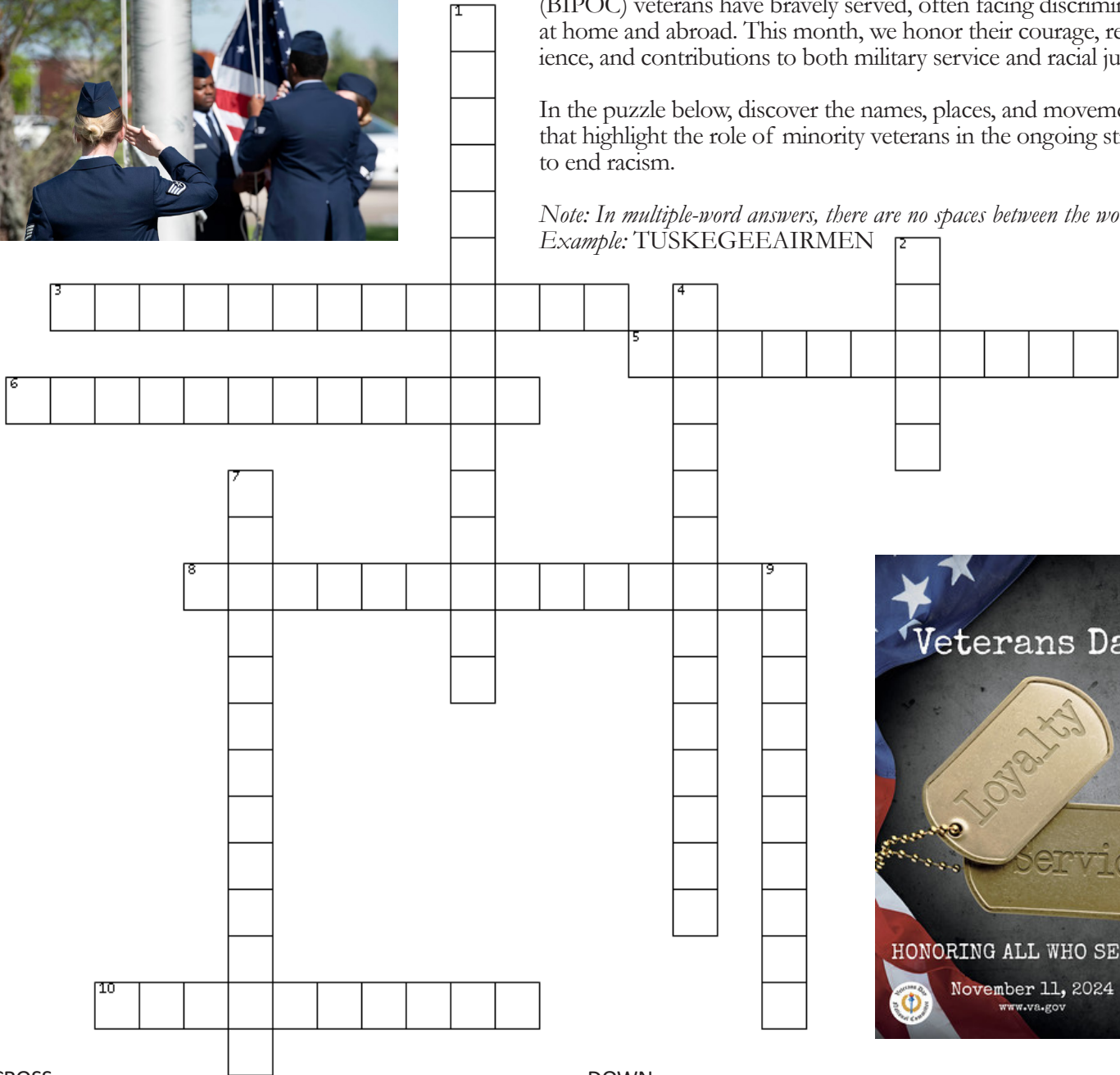
Honoring Service: Veterans' Day and the Struggle for Equality

5. A nickname for Indigenous soldiers who transmitted secure communications in their native languages.
6. The highest U.S. military award, given to service members who have distinguished themselves by acts of valor.
8. The first African American military aviators who flew with excellence during WWII, breaking racial barriers.
10. The devotion shown by BIPOC soldiers who served in the U.S. military despite facing discrimination.

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1. African American regiments formed after the Civil War, serving with distinction despite discrimination.
2. Courage in combat, exemplified by countless BIPOC veterans who fought against both enemies abroad and prejudice.
4. The systemic unfair treatment that many BIPOC veterans faced both during and after military service.
7. WWII campaign by Black Americans for victory over both fascism abroad and racism at home.
9. Refers to the unbreakable code developed by Navajo Code Talkers in WWII.

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
