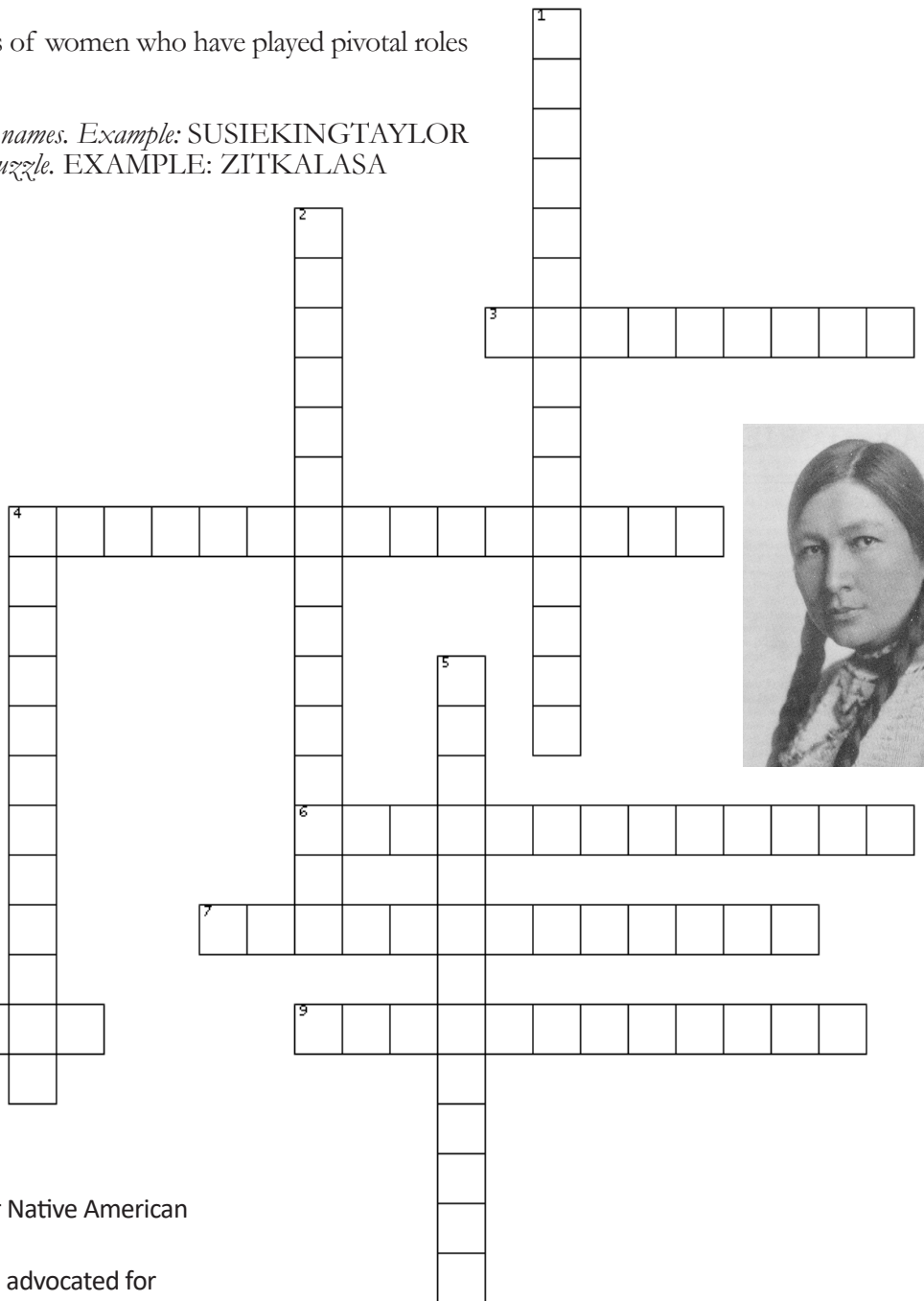
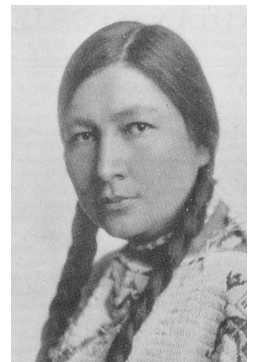


# Hidden Figures: Women in the Struggle for Justice

## ACROSS

3. Indigenous activist who advocated for Native American rights and citizenship.
4. Chinese immigrant and suffragist who advocated for women's voting rights.
6. First Black woman to run for U.S. vice president in 1952.
7. Abolitionist and women's suffrage leader who became one of the first Black writers to popularize African American protest poetry.
8. Civil rights activist and wife of Medgar Evers, who continued his work for justice.
9. Journalist and activist who co-founded the National Organization for Women (NOW).

## DOWN

1. Born enslaved, she was the first Black Army nurse and served as an educator during the Civil War.
2. Paiute author and activist who fought for Native American land rights.
4. One of the first African American women to speak in public on political, religious, and racial issues, she advocated for the abolition of slavery, equality, and for women's rights.
5. Formerly enslaved woman who won a lawsuit for reparations in 1878.
